## President's Message

Chris faced many difficult circumstances such as a runoff election for Mayor, the Casino in Westbury and the Nassau County proposal for the Clinton and Stewart Intersection to name a few. She directed the EPOA through so many of these difficult issues to achieve positive outcomes for the residents of the East. Chris leaves the EPOA Board in great shape to continue to serve residents of the East.

I am looking forward to working with Tom Hogan our new Vice President and our other returning officers and directors. With these four new directors we have welcomed nine new directors over the last two years. September kicks off the official start of another EPOA year. However there were several issues that the EPOA was monitoring and working on over the summer. One issue that dated back to the end of last winter was the conditions of many roads in the Village. The brutal winter last year caused damage to many roads in Garden City. While the Garden City DPW was able to repair the Village controlled roads during the spring, the Nassau County Roads were still neglected all the way through the summer months. Two County roads in the East that were in awful shape were Washington Ave and Clinton Road. Mayor Episcopia and East Trustee John Delany got in contact with Nassau County Legislator Laura Schaeffer and scheduled a meeting to discuss the roads. With Legislator Schaeffer's help both Washington Ave and Clinton Road should be paved in the coming weeks.

There were several traffic and parking issues in the East that were brought to the attention of the EPOA over the summer. One issue was a major parking issue on Meadow Street near the Franklin Court area. At the request of the EPOA the Traffic Commission held two special meetings during the summer to address the issue. Measures are being taken to alleviate the problem to the satisfaction of the residents who live nearby.

Along with being President of the EPOA, I have the privilege of serving as President of the Joint Conference Committee (JCC). In an effort to promote communication and cooperation among the four POAs, the presidents and vice presidents of each Property Owners' Association form the JCC to address issues that affect the entire village, providing a collective voice to the Mayor and Board of Trustees. The President of the JCC is rotated so that the JCC President is from the same POA as the Mayor. The JCC has already convened for this year and is working on several projects as well as recruiting residents for several boards and committees.

## Trustees' Update: Nick Episcopia and John Delany

**Board Activity** - The Board of Trustees (BOT) has had a very busy summer. Contractors were approved for the Senior/Community Center and the renovation of the firehouse, and the respected firm of Cameron Engineering has been retained to advise the Village on the best way to restore and maintain the ball fields in Community Park.

New lighting was purchased for the east wing of St Paul's School, front spotlights were replaced and the existing shrubbery trimmed. The steps to the Cluett Hall entrance were repaired and the driveway was repaved. Repairs to our streets and parking lots continue. Our Civic Beautification Committee, along with our Parks and Recreation Staff should be complemented on the flowers and other plantings which have made Village Hall and the Franklin – Stewart mall area so attractive.

The Village is essentially on budget for the first months of our new fiscal year and the BOT will continue to closely monitor all our operating and capital expenses to make sure your tax dollars are being spent wisely.

**Contract Updates** - Labor contracts have been settled with our Police Department and the CSEA Supervisors. At present, we are in what is known as the 'Fact-finding' phase with the CSEA rank and file. This group has rejected two offers made by the Village after their union leaders approved them. After the "factfinder" has issued his report, we will again try to reach a settlement, but if there is no agreement, we will then go to 'Legislative Determination'. Pursuant to law, this effectively says there will be no pay increase while all other terms of the existing contract remain in place, and the entire negotiation process will start all over again. Hopefully a settlement can be reached before this happens.

We have not settled with our paid firefighters. The BOT has a certain long-range plan for our Fire Department which we believe will improve both economy and efficiency without any effect on service. It has been several years since we have had a new contract with the paid firefighters. As with the CSEA rank and file, we hope to come to a satisfactory settlement. However, if we cannot, by law, we will have to again go to arbitration and accept the arbitrator's decision. The BOT has also retained "ICMA" a nationally known consulting firm, to do a complete study of our Fire Department.

**Fire and Police** - We cannot say enough about the work of our volunteer firefighters. They had a successful recruiting campaign and we were happy to approve several new recruits. In addition to their outstanding work as firefighters, these volunteers participate in many of our village activities, such as the annual Fire Prevention Open House, Homecoming Parade, Village Christmas Tree lighting and the Annual 9-11 Commemorative Ceremony. The latter is especially worthy of note. It is a very tasteful and respectful ceremony, and we thank our volunteer firefighters for taking the time each year to remember this tragedy and the people who perished.

Our police continue to do an outstanding job of protecting all of us. Our three new academy graduates are now on the job and we continue to vigorously enforce our speed limits as well as violations, especially DWI. Please remember that we all have responsibility for our safety. Please lock the doors of your homes and cars, and report any suspicious or strange activity as soon as you see it.

**Staff Changes** -There have been additional changes to our Village Senior Staff. Both James Olivo, our Auditor, and Frank Kelly who was in charge of tax assessments, have retired. Irene Wu is now our new Village Treasurer and Sandra Yu-Clarkson is our Auditor. Irene worked for the Village as a financial consultant and performed admirably in that position. We are confident that these ladies will be excellent additions to our Senior Staff. Michael Filippou, who has served us for many years as Building Superintendent, has announced his retirement and his replacement, Ausberto Huertas, has been hired. We are very pleased that Mike has agreed to stay on for a few months to make sure we have a smooth transition.

**Condition of Nassau County Roads** - The Mayor and staff of the Village Department of Public Works (DPW) met with the Deputy Commissioner of Public Works to discuss the condition of the 17 County roads in the Village, the Village might consider taking over the maintenance of some of these

roads. While a number of proposals were discussed, one possibility would be to have the Village maintaining some of the roads while the County would continue to plow and cut the grass. A thorough cost analysis must be completed before any further action is taken. During the meeting, the County advised that during the fall of 2015 they will be repaving both Washington Avenue and Clinton Road from Meadow Street to Old Country Road.

## School Board Updates—Bob Martin and Tom Pinou

The Garden City School Board extends its thanks to the community for their tremendous support of the Budget for the 2015 – 2016 school year and for the establishment of a Capital Reserve. Both initiatives received over 80% of the votes cast.

The budget to budget increase for this year is 0.67%, the lowest increase in the past 17 years. The Capital Reserve will be used to finance several major projects. Some of the projects under consideration include replacing the turf field at the high school, installing air conditioning in the high school auditorium, and replacing the roofs at Stratford and Homestead schools. Any funds taken from the Capital Reserve must be approved by a vote of the community.

Our schools have long been recognized for their excellence in academics, extracurricular activities and athletic achievements. This year, U. S. News and World Report named Garden City as the Number One High School on Long Island. While we recognize that these rankings are subjective, we are filled with pride at the recognition of the efforts by our teachers and administrators which culminated in this ranking.

Both contractors are on schedule, demo continues and partitions are going up. We expect work on the new roof to begin as soon as materials are delivered later this week. The driveway sub-base is in and will be completed after the roof is on and the exterior of building is complete. The Recreation department had an initial meeting with the furniture purchaser. Trustee Silver said that residents will be able to follow the senior center's progress on the main village website, which will provide updates on construction "in real time" starting in the next few weeks. The timeline for finishing the project is February.

terrific food provided by John Parks, the concessionaire, and a wine and beer cash bar by Leo's Midway was free for members and two of their guests. Concessionaire John Park's food tallies were as follows: 800 hot dogs, 528 sliders, 90 pounds of mozzarella sticks, 30 pounds of nachos, 75 pounds of chicken wings plus cheese boards and vegetable platters. The Commission's plan is to possibly have the pool party twice in a season, one in the beginning in June and one at the same time as the Labor Day weekend party. The idea of a Fourth of July weekend has also been discussed. The Commission will continue to consider other new ideas for next year's season.

### **Community Park Field Project**

In order to determine how to best manage the fields in Community park, the Board of Trustees recently authorized a geotechnical analysis and a full report on the subsurface findings of the areas - Field 1 which is the softball field, Field 2 the little league field and the entire soccer field, plus fields 3 and 4. This analysis was designed to help the Board fully understand the make-up of these fields and better understand how they were constructed and how they should be treated and maintained. Maps of Community Park were distributed at the Recreation Commission meeting, highlighting areas in pink that were determined to be "unclassified soils" which may not be good candidates for synthetic turf. Those soils tend not to be buildable because there is a lot of organic material that is likely to settle over time. Kevin McAndrew from Cameron Engineering presented the soil study's findings and recommendations at the Thursday, September 10 Village Board of Trustees' meeting. The next step in the process is to determine the extent of the remediation that would be required and the associated cost.

### **Village Introduces GC Connect Mobile App**

The Village has launched a new program that will enable Garden City residents to report service requests through a mobile app, encouraging civic involvement and improved response times. Powered by SeeClickFix, the platform allows residents to submit a request for service on issues ranging from replacing a street light, reporting potholes or seeking park maintenance.

When submitting issues, residents can provide locational, descriptive and photographic information as they see the issue in real time. The free mobile app, called *GC Connect* is now available for iPhone and Android devices and can be easily downloaded from the App Store.

"This is just another example of how your Board of Trustees is trying to better communicate with the public and make our Village government more relevant to everyone." Mayor Nicholas P. Espicopia said.

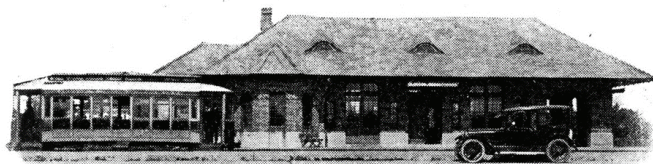
## Facts of the East—Bill Bellmer

### The Central Extension and Clinton Road Station

A major feature of A. T. Stewart's Garden City was his creation of a railroad to transport persons from New York, via Long Island City, to the new community. Using the services of the Flushing & North Side R.R. as far as the Garden City area, the Central Railroad of Long Island of 1873 stopped at the present location in Garden City, then continued in a sweeping curve just west of Washington Ave. to a terminal on Fulton St. in Hempstead. The railroad also continued eastward from what is often called the Wye, east of Franklin Ave., to Stewart's brickworks in Bethpage, and ultimately to Babylon. Passenger service via this Central Extension soon included two trains daily all the way to Patchogue, until 1880 (four years after Stewart died), when it was discontinued due to lack of patronage, although the track remained through the Hempstead Plains until World War Two.

In 1906, trolley service (using third rail) was started from the Garden City station to Merrick Ave. to serve the Meadowbrook Hunt Club and in 1917 the Salisbury Golf Club. When the East part of the Village was developed in 1910, a station was located at Clinton Road to serve it – fully as elegant as the one that had been set up for the residents of the Estates in 1908. However, unlike Nassau Boulevard, there was hardly anyone to use it. This all changed in 1917, when Camp Mills was built south of the rail line and east of Clinton Road. Suddenly it was necessary to double-track the line to handle the activity, and the Clinton Road station became a busy place. A trolley stop was also added at Washington Ave., the remains of which are still there. In 1919, when Camp Mills was closed, the line still saw passenger service for Aviation Field #2, later called Mitchel Field. The western end of the trolley service was relocated in 1922 to Country Life Press station. The trolley was replaced by a two-car LIRR train in 1933. After World War Two, additional shuttle stops were added to serve the industries being built along Stewart Ave., including Newsday, A&P, and General Bronze. By 1953 demand in general had fallen off, and scheduled service was discontinued. Special trains to service Roosevelt Raceway continued until 1961, after which the electrification was removed.

The Clinton Road station building was repurposed in 1952 as our east-side firehouse, and the south side platform still remains to remind us of busier railroad times.
